The Church of Scotland extends a warm invitation to all believers in the Lord Jesus Christ to join them in this sacred ordinance. The collection on retiring from the Communion Service is on behalf of the Maintenance of Ministry Fund.

Church Extension .- A letter has recently been posted to all members of the congregation inviting them to state anew what financial aid they are prepared to offer towards the erection of a new church on present site. Owing to the holiday months intervening the posting of these letters has been delayed for two months, and members are therefore asked to give this matter their immediate attention, and return the two forms sent with letter at earliest convenience, so that the Extension Committee may have this necessary information as soon as possible. The Committee intend to proceed with the plans for erecting the new church of brick, subject to the approval of the congregation. If these returns reveal what we already feel confident is the case, that the congregation will enthusiastically support the scheme, then we hope to have plans ready on which to start at the beginning of next year.

In Memoriam

It was with the deepest sorrow that the congregation heard when they had assembled for the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the 2nd of May of the sudden death of Mr Robert Anderson, Craigard. He had been faithful during the week in the distribution of the Communion Cards in his district, and was present at the Service of Preparation on the previous Friday, but he passed peacefully into the presence of his Saviour in the early hours of the Communion Sabbath. It is almost forty years since he came to Newton Mearns from Thornliebank, where he had begun in partnership with his brother, Mr J. Taylor Anderson, the business which to-day bears their honoured name. As soon as he came to the district he identified himself with this congregation, of which he was appointed an Elder in 1919. He gave to the Church the benefit of the gifts with which he was endowed, and we shall miss the wise counsel he so often gave, and the keen, penetrating insight with which he saw quickly the real issue in any situation.

Again it was with the deepest regret the congregation heard of the death of Mr James Taylor Anderson, Springbank, on the morning of Sabbath 1st August, after a long and trying illness. When he came to Newton Mearns with his brother he also joined our Church, and took a very active part in all matters connected therewith, being elected an Elder in 1927. For many years he was a member of the Choir, for fifteen years he was Clerk to the Managers, and for twenty-eight years Congregational Treasurer, from which position he resigned in February last owing to his illness. This is a unique record of service to our Church, and few, if any of us, can realise the enormous amount of work and sacrifice involved. Any task he undertook had his whole-hearted and energetic attention, and his driving force will be much missed in Session and Board meetings.

Both brothers took a deep interest in the welfare of the Church, bringing to the congregational life that keen business acumen and integrity of character which was so outstanding a feature in their lives. By their deaths the Session and congregation have suffered a very serious loss.
