MINISTER'S LOG.

The General Assembly of 1962 has concluded its deliberations. The Right Reverend Dr. Neville Davidson, the Minister of Glasgow Cathedral, proved himself from all accounts to be an excellent Moderator of the Assembly, and the Lord High Commissioner was the Earl of Maitland, who had already adorned his high office with dignity and distinction. As I was not this year a member (it only falls to one every four years, which I think is too long an interval), I cannot give any personal impressions. The very important question of nuclear disarmament was again before the house, showing the concern of the Church, but nothing new was said on the subject. The only decision that aroused widespread interest was on the subject of the observance of the Lord's Day. It was that more latitude should be shown towards the use of it as regards physical recreation. It is difficult when one has been brought up all one's life to a more strictly sabbatarian view to adjust one's mind along a new approach. Perhaps we were too strictly brought up. On the other hand some of us feel it did us little harm and much good—physically, mentally and spiritually. It may be, however, that

a little relaxation of the rigidity is called for, as long as the new liberty does not develop into licence. To use the day Christ rose from the dead for as noble purposes as possible, including public worship and family life as well as the much needed rest for the body should, I think, be the aim of

every Christian.
I would like to congratulate the Youth Fellowship on their completion of another very successful session. Those who were present at their customary evening Carol Service at Christmas will realise the strength of this body of youth in our realise the strength of this body of youth in our midst. The syllabus was drawn up with care, and some of the addresses we listened to, both from visiting speakers and from within our congregation, were most stimulating. The year reached its climax at the beginning of April when on their own initiative, a house to house collection was carried through on behalf of the Save the Children Fund. The Fellowship "put its back" into this task, and growned it with an Easter Fair on the Saturday. raising about £350. This was just the kind of venture that one would expect from youth in the Church and it was forthcoming. The group has this year been most ably led by Mr Millar Whalley. It is impossible to speak to highly of the quality of leadership which he gave to them. He challenged them repeatedly to various branches of Christian Service and they responded. He will be the first to admit that he received willing support, and to the Youth Fellowship as a whole, including their able secretary, Miss Wendy Watt, we would like to offer our thanks. The president for 1962-63 is Mr Donald McDougall, the vice-president, Mr Robbie Anderson, and the secretary, Miss Linda Shaw. We invite all youth in the Church of 16 years and over to come and join in the Autumn.
