#### MINISTER'S LOG

After the General Election I read a comment that made me stop and think. A writer in a well known weekly paper said that although the Liberals had now more members in the House of Commons, they spoke with a lesser voice of the people. What he meant, of course was that the electorate that had voted for the party had been a diminished percentage. Sometimes we who are communicants of the church forget that we are the voice of the Christian fellowship in our own community and unto the end of the earth. It is our duty to watch that the trumpet sounds with no uncertain note, and that in our speech and action we let the message of the Gospel be heard. Sometimes I feel, and this applies to all of us, we are unmindful of our responsibility, and that by our uncharitable judgements, our careless daily work, and our irregular attendance at public worship we do not realise how we are failing in our witness. Did I

not, said the maid, see thee in the garden with Him?

We would like to draw your attention to the fact that the Organists' Association in Glasgow, of which the president this year is Mr Walter Cuthill, has arranged to hold a recital in our church on 23rd April, at 3 p.m. The officiating organist will be Mr William Coulthard, of Wellington Church and music master at Glasgow Academy. He was as you know our consultant when the new organ was installed. At the close a discussion will take place. While this is a meeting of the Association a warm invitation has been extended by it to members of the congregation and friends.

The Daffodil Tea organised by the Woman's Guild on Saturday, 2nd April, was an enjoyable and colourful forenoon. The sum of £60 was realised. There are perhaps no flowers so beautiful as those of Spring and after the exacting winter it was good to look upon them. The Woman's Guild had had a sale in the late Autumn and this was not meant to be anything but a pleasant social gathering. As such it was a great success, and one enjoyed meeting folks again in this manner.

The Boys' Brigade is anxious to resuscitate the pipe band. In order to raise funds-it will probably entail £250—it has been decided to embark on what is called a Rag Drive. #### **OBITUARIES**

Miss Dorothy Holland, late of 30 Edgemont Street, Shawlands, died on Friday, 25th February, 1966. She and her two sisters came to live in this district before the Second War of 1939 from East Kilbride where they had stayed for many years, and been devoted members of what was then the West Church in the ministry of Mr Liddell. They had, however come from the Maryhill side of Glasgow. On the death of her two sisters she moved to Edgemont Street until the beginning of 1966 when she went in to Bon Secours Nursing Home, and later to the Dirlton Rest Home.

She became a very active member of the congregation, and a regular attender at the Woman's Guild. By profession she was a teacher. She had a most alert mind and it did not seem to lose its keenness to the end of her days. impression was that she must have been a very good teacher, and one who always had a very good grasp of her subject. She kept in touch with many of her scholars, and they did not forget her. She followed their careers with interest, and perhaps rejoice that she had had a part in their life. There are few legacies in life more valuable than to have had one in one's early days that opened to us the gates of knowledge. We miss her much for she was a link with the past, and knew so many people that we knew. Her brother-in-law, Mr George Marshall was most attentive to her and visited her twice every week. His care of her cannot be overpraised. To her sister, who is unable to leave her house, her brothers-in-law and all her kith and kin we extend our deepest sympathy.

Mr David McAuley, 46 Orchard Park Court, died on Friday, 18th February, 1966. On his retiral he came to live at Juniper, Ayr Road, Newton Mearns and on the death of his wife his sister-in-law, Miss Henderson whose death took place in London within a fortnight later, kept house for him. He was not unknown to me when he came to live here. He delivered the letters as a postman to the house in Pollokshields where I was brought up as a child. On a postman's pay which was not over generous in those days, he sent his two sons to the University and gave his daughter a good education. Those were the days, moreover when university grants were not what they are to-day. He told me that he had to watch every penny in order to do so, and that sometimes it almost made one mean towards others. He had the great satisfaction, however, of seeing them all comfortably settled in life. He was a good and a keen golfer, and for most of his life a member of Cowglen Golf Club. It was a great joy to him that at the end he was made an honorary member. Miss Henderson looked after him latterly with great diligence until he had to go into hospital. It is strange that they should have died within days of each other, she in a hospital in London where she had gone to stay with his son. To his sons and daughter we extend to-day our deep sympathy.

Miss Robina Wilkie was another sister-in-law who looked after her sister's husband, Mr William Baxter of Gilmourton Crescent. She went to live later with Miss Mary Lawson who attended her with great care. She died in a nursing home in Glasgow on Saturday, 19th February, 1966. Born in Perth she always had a great love of one of Scotland's loveliest counties and used to go back each year to see her friends. Her deafness became a great handicap to her, and cut her off from human fellowship. In herself she had a great kindliness of heart, and was interested in all that went on in the life of the church.

#### ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

The Annual Business Meeting was held in the hall on Wednesday, March 16th, at 7.30 p.m. The financial statement was submitted by the treasurer Mr Walter Rodger, and approved. Mr Jarvie, one of the auditors, spoke of the immaculate way in which the accounts were kept, and said that he thought they were a model for all church treasurers. He was warmly thanked for the work he had done during the year as were those associated with him especially Mr A. S. McCance and Mr Paul Wood

After the usual buiness had been transacted and tea had been served by the ladies of the Congregational Board assisted by members of the Youth Fellowship, Mr Mackay made a presentation to Mr Paul Wood the retiring Registrar on behalf of the congregation. He pointed out that he had filled the onerous office for 14 years and had addressed in that time about 20,000 envelopes, a figure which the treasurer raised to 24,000 in a few witty remarks in support! Mr Wood was then handed a transistor set and suitably replied. We regret very much that he is leaving us to live in Busby but he will be close to his son and daughterin-law. He leaves behind a fine record of most faithful service to the church as an elder and registrar.

After some delightful music from the choir which interspersed the second half of the evening, the chairman then said that it was 21 years since Mr Thom became Session Clerk and it was felt that this was a suitable occasion to express their gratitude to one who had done so much for the church. He had also been treasurer for 8 years and that included the period when the new church was built in 1939. Mr Mackay spoke of his varied career-a graduate of Aberdeen University; served from 1914-1919 in the Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders and was commissioned; taught in Greenock and Lochwinnoch before coming as Head Master to Mearns in 1931 and finally in the South School, Paisley. In his work as Session Clerk he had been supported by his wife who had for the past 4 years been President of the Woman's Guild. We owed a great debt to him as did the church at large for he had served on many Presbytery and Assembly Committees. This was just a thank you to him for all he had done and in the hope that he would be spared to serve the congregation for many years to Mr Basil Baird the representative of the youngest group of elders and the grandson of our senior elder then, in some well chosen words handed over a Parker Pen, a transistor set, and a cheque from the members of the Session and the Board.

After a vote of thanks to Mr W. T. Davidson for his faithful work during the year the evening closed with the Doxology and the Benediction.
