*---** MINISTER'S LOG

At the Annual Business Meeting of the Congregation, there was proposed by Mr Walter Rodger that 40 hymns be taken out of the list of those hymns proposed to be excluded, and that the Assembly Hymnary Revision Committee be notified accordingly. This after discussion was approved unanimously. In the main, therefore, the drastic action of the Assembly Committee was agreed to whereby 300 hymns approximately should be omitted from the suggested new book. There were some present who spoke strongly against any change in

the present one, especially since it would cause considerable inconvenience to the members and involve the church in an expenditure of about a million and a quarter pounds. On the other hand the praise of the church is a matter of very great importance and, if it is necessary, then the expense should be faced. It was said that the Reformation sang itself into the hearts of the people. Again, there are other churches concerned in the publication that would like to have the 50 excerpts from the Scottish Psalter to be included in it. Yet another fact that we have on good authority is that the new hymnary is to have cut pages, which will enable us to use the tune that one desires. Still further, the selection of children's hymns in the present book is very limited, and this matter requires For all these reasons I think that consideration. this is a work that the Church should undertake, although it may be several years before it is completed. Mr Thom introduced the subject on behalf of the Kirk Session and did so in his usual competent fashion. It was nice to see him restored to health and back at his post. We would thank Mr Marchant for the work that he did in this connection, and the Congregation for the lists that it sent in.

The Ordination and Induction of Elders to the congregation will take place on Sunday, 16th April, at 11.30 a.m. It is only two years since the previous one. It was on April 5th, 1965. There have been however, many changes due to death, and removal from the district and the Session decided that it was necessary to add to our number. We welcome especially those who have recently come to the district, and have agreed to take this active part in the life of the congregation.

A brief report was given at the Business Meeting by the Treasurer on the present position of the projected new halls. Until the plans for redevelopment by Sir Ian Mactaggart are finalised by him, and agreed to by the County officials, we do not know the exact measurement of the ground that we hope to acquire at the back of the church. These have now been approved in principle. Meantime the Board decided to ask the Church Architects—Honeyman, Jack and Robertson to prepare plans of new halls. These have been before a committee of the Board, and further consultation is in progress.

AN EXCERPT FROM "AN EASTER SERMON" IN THE SPECTATOR by QUINTIN HOGG

"Granted that papal infallibility is still a serious stumbling block (as are many other issues) can

one devote one's spiritual life-time to attacking or defending it when the whole basis of belief in a supernatural world is in question?

If the Churches would get down to a little honest philosophy and history to persuade the earnest enquirers that there are grounds for religious beliefs of any kind, that the man is not merely wrong, but historically illiterate in claiming that Jesus never existed, that there are grounds for believing the broad historical accuracy of the Gospel, that the mysterious figure whom Christians revere as man and God did teach that the merciful are blessed, did heal the sick, they might not obliterate their differences, but they would at least secure the continuity of their own existence.

The Church is faced with the biggest challenge to its existance since the days of Nero. It is a rare privilege to own Church membership at such a time. Christian may, if they will, comfort themselves with the reflection that if they fail it can only be because what they have said about Jesus of Nazerath and His following is false, and that if it is not false in the end they cannot fail. But that they should pre-occupy themselves with the ridiculous minuet of traditional disputation invites the comment of Alexander the Great when informed of a traditional battle between the Athenians and the Spartans that it was a fight between frogs and mice."

OBITUARIES

Mr Alexander J. Allan, 12 Lambie Crescent, died at his residence on Wednesday, March 1, 1967. He was a member of the police force in Glasgow. Unfortunately through illness he had to retire at an early age. His wife has been crippled with illness and he was able latterly to devote his time to looking after her. To her, and his son, we offer the deep sympathy of the congregation in their bereavement.

Miss Elizabeth Moore, Eastwoodhill Home, Giffnock, died in a city home on Sunday, March 12, 1967. She lived for many years in a house behind the "doctor's buildings" in Main Street. Most of her working life was spent in the telephone department of the G.P.O. At that time she lived in the Shawlands district of Glasgow and was a member of Queen's Park West Church. It was on her retiral that she came to this district. Looking back on her life, one would say that she had a great love for the church. It did not show itself in any particular way, unless it be that she was always in the midst of it doing a little here and a little there. She was a regular attender of the Woman's Guild and present at all the special functions. When she went to Eastwoodhill, she still retained her membership, and would, on occasion, when I took the service there, hand me her Systematic Giving Envelopes. The presence at the funeral service of some members of Queen's Park West Church, which she had left many years before, showed where she had made her friends in years past. At Eastwoodhill she was always watchful never to disturb other residents. Such is the picture that she leaves in one's memory we shall miss her gracious personality, and we thank her kith and kin and Mrs Pinkerton, the matron at Eastwoodhill, for the care that they took of her.

Mr J. Haig Haddow, J.P., of Craigend of Capelrig, Newon Mearns, died in a nursing home on Monday, March 20, 1967. He was a partner with Thomson, McLintock & Co., Chartered Accountants, Glasgow, and a member of the Valuation Appeals Committee for Renfrewshire. He was educated at Bellahouston Academy, and was commissioned in the Great War with the 5th Scottish Rifles, the Cameronians, and wounded in 1916. The latter incompacitated him for the rest of his life. He did not, however, allow it to restrict his activities, and as his appointments show he lived a full life in business, took a share in local affairs, and enjoyed his recreation. He and his wife came from the Ibrox district of Glasgow to this neighbourhood in the late thirties, bought an old farm house, and reconditioned it into a place of beauty. He loved the countryside and especially the flowers. A great sorrow was the death of one of his three sons who had served all through the last war in a submarine.

He was a man of wise counsel, deep affection, and gracious personality. To his widow, his sons and his daughters-in-law, we extend the deep sympathy of the congregation.

As we go to press we would like to offer our sympathy to the Misses Gow, Knockdollon, Beech Avenue, on the death of their brother. He came from the south to live with them seven years ago when his wife died. Through infirmity he was seldom able to leave the house, and did not accordingly join the congregation. He became again a very intregal part of the family, and to them and his kith and kin we would express our deepest sympathy.
