MINISTER'S LOG

I hope you had a good holiday, whether by the seaside, the mountain glen or overseas. I spent July on the Island of Arran, at Blackwaterfoot. One day I made a sojourn to the famous King's Caves. As one enters Machrie there is a road to the left past Laggan House, that turns along the sea-shore until it comes to a deadend. There you see a notice board "Public path to the King's Caves 1½ miles". The public path was so narrow that one brushed one's clothes in the heather on either side. After falling into more than one burn which was too wide to jump, and travelling what seemed more like 5 miles, one descended to the shore by a precipitous path. A further 200 yards over a rocky beach brought one to the entrance to the Caves. There are several of these and the main one is enclosed in iron railings. It is very deep and the walls are covered with countless initials of visitors. The finest inscriptions are those of a Cross and a Crown showing that the Covenanters held their Conventicles in it. Tradition has it, of course, that here Robert the Bruce sat in a despondent mood, having tried to become King of Scotland six times. He watched a spider make the same number of attempts to reach the top of the Cave. On each occasion he fell back. It started once again and succeeded. Robert the Bruce resolved to try once more and succeeded. It is a great lesson on perseverance and it may be that though we have tried to achieve something and failed, often we could make up our minds to make yet another, in the home, in the school, or in the Church.

The dedication of the colours of a new additional company of the Girl Guides, the 3rd Mearns, took place in the Church on Sunday 17th June. Miss Muriel Russell, the Captain, came forward and put the request to the Minister. As they draped the Communion Table—the Queen's and the Company Colours—he laid his hand upon them and set them apart in an act of Prayer. Having handed them over to the colour party, they were then taken into the custody of the Church until the end of the Service. The Minister addressed the congregation on the subject of the little captive maid in the household of Naaman the Syrian. He had contracted the dreaded disease of leprosy and she had the courage to say that there was a prophet in her country of Samaria who would heal him. He spoke of her as the first known Girl Guide in the Bible. She had shown the colours of her Faith. How this Sisterhood, started by Lord Baden Powell, had grown until it covered the earth. The Colours were a gift from a lady in the congregation who wants to remain anonymous. We would express our thanks to her.

VARIA

A class for First Communicants will open in the Manse, 204 Ayr Road on Tuesday 18th September and meet on successive Tuesdays until the Communion. Those who are older in years and do not wish to come to the class, should communicate with me—639 2747. Attendance at the class does not carry with it the obligation to join. It is not necessary, according to the laws of the Church of Scotland, that one should take these vows before the congregation. They can do so either before the Session or the Minister alone.

Remembrance Day will be observed on the second Sunday in November. The Youth Organisations will be on parade at the 11.30 a.m. Service.

Car Park facilities around the Church are now available for use by the general public and can be made use of on any occasion.

We had the pleasure of having children from Northern Ireland during the period of the joint Services with Mearnskirk. This has been a most excellent piece of work. Groups of twenty have come over every fortnight. They have been housed by people in the district, and taken each in turns to the coast or country by bus. A packed lunch was prepared by the Choir of Mearnskirk each day. It has been greatly appreciated by the children Mr. Black went to Belfast during July to assist a Minister The city.

OBITUARIES

Mr. James A. Anderson, Balmae, Lethington Avenue, died in hospital on Tuesday 19th June 1973. He was the senior Elder of the congregation having been ordained in 1934. He was clerk to the Congregational Board when the present Church was built in 1939. A considerable burden fell on his shoulders at that time. He was a partner in Connell & Anderson, Stockbrokers. His mother gifted a stained glass window in memory of another son who was killed in the First World War. It had to be placed in the Gallery because the present hall obscured the light and made it impossible to put it in the Chancel. His wife, though born in Clarkston, had always had a close connection with the congregation as a member of the Carswell family. He was a most regular attender at public worship. He looked after his district with diligence. To his widow, who has been handicapped with arthritis for many years, and to his daughters Sheena and Margaret we offer the deep sympathy of the Church.

Mrs. Rankin of Crookfur Cottages died on 19th June 1973. Latterley she occupied a bed-sitter in the Fraser Institute. She was a woman of a very bright personality. It is not always easy to adapt yourself to a new environment, no matter how pleasant it be, but from the very beginning she set out to enrich it as far as she could. We can always visualise her either going into or coming out of her room with a smile on her face. She will be greatly missed and to her kith and kin we extend our sympathy.

Mr. John Russell, 206 Ayr Road, died on Sunday 22nd July 1973. His death came as a great shock to the congregation and to the parish. He had suffered a heart attack in June but he had made such a good recovery that one hoped he had many years ahead. The family in which he was brought up had a long ancestry in Mearns Parish. They moved into Newton House when the Newton Church built the new Manse on the Ayr Road about 100 years ago. John and Isa came to live in their present house when the village was demolished recently. The Russell family has been famous in the district for generations as rose growers. It was quite usual for John to win 19 prizes at the Glasgow Flower Show. He was in demand all over the South of Scotland as a judge at annual shows. He was appointed President of the Mearns Horticultural Society in 1943. His enthusiasm communicated itself to others. His knowledge of plants was encyclopaedic. He was not only a good grower but a generous one. No one left his garden without a gift of flowers or vegetables. If the garden will always be associated with his name the Church was also very dear to his heart. He was in the midst of the life of it. He was ordained as an Elder. He sang all his days in the choir. No special service or social function but flowers from his garden beautified the Sanctuary or decorated the hall. He was kindly, generous and helpful by nature. We shall miss him much and to Isa and Andrew, his brother-in-law and sisterin-law, and his kith and kin, some in West Renfrewshire and others in Fife, we extend the deepest sympathy of the congregation.

Miss Janet M. Allan, Gosforth, Elmwood Avenue, died on 16th August, 1973 in her 88th year. Early in September she would have attained her 89th birthday. She made a practice each Tuesday of hiring a car, going into town, having lunch and then visiting a few shops, She retained her strength of personality and alertness of mind to the end of her days. Her father, who came from Fife, had a fruit importing business, and her brother and she carried it on. She took a great interest in all that went on in the world. For the Church also she had a deep love. Latterly she would hire transport to come to it. She invited Mrs. King when she was a widow to come and stay with her, which she did to the end. To her sister-in-law Mrs. Nancy Allan, Mrs. King. and to her housekeeper we offer the loving sympathy of the congregation.

Mr. Roger A. Chapman, 21 Sunningdale Avenue, died on 16th August 1973 in hospital. He was in Insurance all his life. In July he celebrated his 89th Birthday in Mearnskirk Hospital and the Sister and nursing staff made an occasion of it and it brought a touch of brightness into the life of the patients. He was a most lovable person—strong in character and yet always most gentle. He was interested in golf, in bowling, and in the garden. For some years he was secretary of the Whitecraigs Bowling Club. For many years he and his wife were members of Camphill Church, Queen's Park. In the last few years they transferred their membership to this congregation. We shall miss his friendly nature, and to his wife who has watched over him with devotion, and to his nieces and nephews we extend the deep sympathy of the Church.
