CONGREGATIONAL LOG

We have had the usual special services of this time of year. The Harvest Thanksgiving service saw a full church—full not only with people either! Our welcoming new members by profession of faith was a very happy occasion. The Friday evening service of preparation for Holy Communion was quite well attended and provided a helpful chance for meditative preparation. Our Communion services were attended by a little over five hundred members, some members being unable to attend because of the holiday week. Our hymn practising on November 6th was enjoyable, and indeed quite musical! And the Remembrance Day service was held with the normal procession on 13th November. One unusual Sunday event was the presentation of a watch to Miss Mary Hay in recognition of her 51 years of service as a Sunday School teacher.

Things have been happening during the week as well, however. Especially memorable was the Queen's Guide presentation to Muriel Dinsmor, attended by the largest gathering of well-wishers that such a presentation has seen at our church. Muriel's impressive achievements were listed, the badge and certificate were presented and Muriel added to the fine standard of entertainment throughout the evening by singing as beautifully as usual. We congratulate her, her parents, and all the guides of the 2nd Mearns Company who contributed to her success.

Another success was the Woman's Guild coffee morning on November 5th, when by great effort and enthusiasm the ladies of the Guild raised more than £300. The Fund Raising Whist Drives continue, presently on the second Tuesday of every month, but in the new year to be on the first or second Monday of every month, alternate with the Guild and Young Woman's Group meetings.

A Youth Fellowship has now started and meets every Sunday evening at 7.30 p.m. in the Upper Hall. It is open to those in their later teens and twenties and promises to become a most enjoyable and successful group. A copy of the parts of the syllabus so far arranged is given under.

Our Christmas service arrangements are as follows. On December 18th our main morning service will involve the children in a gift service and a setting of the Christmas nativity scene. That same day an evening service/concert will be led by Mrs. Binning and her pupils from Woodfarm School. The following Saturday night, Christmas Eve, we shall have the watch-night service at 11.30 p.m. with the singing of carols, as we gather, from 11.10 p.m. We are hoping for a large attendance at that service; please come along. Then on Christmas Day the Session has agreed that it would be more convenient for everybody, to hold only *one* service and that at 10.30 a.m. This departure from the normal times is to facilitate late risers and big-lunch preparers, and we hope that that family service (to which children should bring their favourite gifts) will be well supported. For the same reasons, we are having the service on New Years Day at 10.30 a.m. also. Please don't forget these changed times.

The first communicants class for the February Communion will have its first meeting on Thursday January 5th at 7.30 p.m. Please tell anyone who may or should be interested.

During October we had to pay for the recent redecoration of the church premises (£562) and very much increased charges for electricity. Arrears of £640 were paid for 1977 to date and the monthly payment has been increased to £170.

Tribute has been already paid to them, but we should like to record our memories of them with gratitude and affection.

We look forward to our next three meetings with pleasure. The 14th November is our Guest night, to which Guild members of all the neighbouring churches and denominations are invited. We shall be entertained by the Williamwood Woman's Guild choir and are sure of an enjoyable evening.

On the 28th November Mr. Cartlidge is going to lead us in Bible Study. Far from being a dull subject, Bible Study can be most enthralling and full of surprise and adventure, and we are happy that Mr. Cartlidge has agreed to guide us in this.

The Christmas Party on the 12th December will be as usual held in the Crookfur Cottage Homes. This is an event in which children figure largely, and we are grateful to Mr. Morrison for bringing with him the school choir which will entertain us.

In the wider field of Guild activities we have taken our place. Delegates have attended the Women's Presbyterial Council and delegates' meetings and

have reported back to us on the requirements of Mission and Service at Home and Overseas and it is to help with these requirements and other special projects, as well as to contribute to our own Congregational needs that our annual coffee morning is held.

This year we raised the sum of £310 on Saturday 5th November. Our thanks are due to the many friends who rallied round with contributions and who spent a little time among us over coffee so delightfully served by members of the Girl Guides.

One other piece of service undertaken by our Committee was to supply, prepare and serve soup at the Lodging House Mission, East Campbell Street, on November 24th. This is a piece of work cheerfully performed in surroundings far from cheerful, and among the poor lost souls who are ever with us and who so constantly need our help. Thank you fellow members for the generous donations of cereals and vegetables required for this very worthy work.

OBITUARIES

Mrs. Chrissie McCance of 14 Castle Court died on Friday 21st October in the Victoria Infirmary. She had been a member of the church for 27 years giving faithful attendance and loyal service throughout that time. She came to the area, as Chrissie Scott, to work looking after others, and she married the well-respected elder Mr. A. S. McCance whose son now serves us as Church Treasurer. She became involved in the work of the Church and especially the Guild in the quiet dependable way by which we knew her, and the deep happiness which she shared with her husband showed in her kind and peaceful smile. Losing her husband in 1969, she moved from Broomvale Drive to Castle Court where she made good friends of her neighbours. She suffered ill health but bore it with uncomplaining courage and set an example of caring and devotion which we would do well to be able to follow.

She will be missed more deeply than we can say. So our heartfelt sympathy goes out to her family.

Mr. John W. Jarvie, 15 Picketlaw Drive, Carmunnock died at his home on Monday 7th November 1977. He was the senior partner of J. W. Jarvie & Co., St. Vincent Street. He was ordained an elder in 1945 and proved himself on the Session and the Congregational Board to be one of the wisest as well as the

most progressive counsellors on the courts of the church. He served as a member of the New Halls Committee and we owe a great debt to him for his encouragement for not a few years. He loved the country church which ours originally was, but helped nonetheless to build it into the suburban charge it has now become. He, his wife, and his two sons Stirling and Ron were regular attenders from their house in Giffnock. It was only later that he moved to Whitecraigs and then to Carmunnock. He and his wife led a very happy home life, always able to see the humorous side of a situation. They had the joy of seeing their sons happily married and taking an honoured place in their careers, and they have had much happiness in their grandchildren.

His was a full and useful life. He loved the game of golf, and with Mr. Brand he formed and pressed through the idea of moving the Eastwood Golf Club from Giffnock to the new course at Loganswell. That will always remain as one of the most important pieces of work that he did.

I remember him saying on one occasion, 'Money should never be idle in life. It should always be working'. Perhaps that positive approach summarizes the philosophy of his whole life. To his sons, daughters in law, and grandchildren, we offer the deepest sympathy of the congregation he loved and served.

Mrs. Helena Suttie, 9 Dunnolly Drive, died at home on November 6th 1977, aged 90. She came to our area many years ago, moving in to a house which was to have been for herself and her husband, but unfortunately he died just before they were to move. She was interested in the church, being a regular attender, and she was a member of the Guild for a number of years. Always a great character to visit, she was independent in spirit, and the solid devotion she showed in looking after her mother earlier in life came through to later years in the concern she had for the people who knew her. We mark her passing with respect and gratitude, and assure her nephew and family of our thankful remembering.

And whether or not it is clear to you, no doubt the universe is unfolding as it should.

Therefore be at peace with God, whatever you conceive Him to be; and whatever your labours and aspirations, in the noisy confusion of life, keep peace with your soul. With all its shams, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world. Be cheerful. Strive to be happy.
